School Uniform—Reminder including headwear!!

As the weather starts to improve I wanted to remind parents of our expectations with regard to school uniform. All children are expected to wear the school uniform and you can find details on our website: https://polesdenlaceyinfant.surrey.sch.uk/parents/uniform

We have recently found that some children are not wearing appropriate black shoes. Please ensure that the shoes are appropriate school wear. For safety reasons children should wear strong shoes, with a heel height of less than 5cm (2 inches) Fashion shoes, open-toed sandals or boots are not suitable.

We have also had several children in school with jewellery and elaborate head bands. Although these can be lovely, they do provide distractions and are not on our school uniform list which states that:

Long hair (male or female) should be tied back and children should not wear make- up or nail varnish.

Ukraine

As a school we have families who have links both to Ukraine and to Russia. Please do be mindful of the conversations that you have with one another and with your children. One of our school values is 'respect' and another is to be 'caring', this would seem a perfect opportunity to show both values. If you have conversations with your children about the situation please do help them to understand that you cannot stereotype people or generalise. It is so important for us as a school that every child feels valued and welcome no matter what their ethnic origin or language they speak and that they feel confident in who they are and speak the language of the countries they have links to.

Professor Hill advises:

- **Give them the basics and don't avoid the conversation** Listen to their worries and provide honest answers to their questions about what is going on, don't overcomplicate your responses and try to give details at an age-appropriate level. Don't avoid answering their questions about the situation as this could promote more anxiety, but keep to basic facts.
- Ensure they feel supported and safe It's important to help children understand the level of threat to them and their friends and family. Explain this is happening in Ukraine, a different country and show this if necessary using a globe or map.
- Manage your own feelings Try to deal with your own feelings of stress and distress in a way that it is managed as your children will be sensitive to your reactions.
- Explain to your children that bad things can happen in the world but there is always some way we can help Plan together how you might deal with this situation through fundraising or other actions to support the Ukrainian community.
- Avoid exposure to a constant stream of news Be mindful of whether you have the radio or TV on all day, as children will be absorbing news without us realising it. Try to build in 'breaks' from the news, for example, if you are picking up your children from school, turn off the radio or make sure it isn't on a news station to provide a break from the constant exposure to worrying rolling news cycles.
- Watch where they are getting their news We know that fake news is an issue, particularly on social media sites so be mindful of what your children are absorbing and where they are getting it. Ensure they understand that not everything they see on social media sites is true, and they know what reliable sources of news they can access.

Seek advice and support if you are concerned about your child – School staff and educational psychologists can offer specific advice and support if you feel that your child is becoming overly anxious and distressed. Providing support and reassurance and diverting their thoughts through engagement in pleasurable activities can help.

Fairtrade

P is for premium

Over and above the Fairtrade price, the Fairtrade Premium is an additional sum of money which goes into a communal fund for workers and farmers to use – as they see fit – to improve their social, economic and environmental conditions.

It's what sets Fairtrade apart from everyone else. On top of the price farmers and workers receive for their produce or labour, they receive an extra sum of money to invest in improving the quality of their lives. This extra sum of money is called the Fairtrade Premium. Cocoa farmers, as an example, receive an extra \$200 per tonne of cocoa beans they sell. In 2018, more than £166 million of Fairtrade Premium was generated through sales and given back to communities.

To become Fairtrade certified, farmers must join together with other farmers to form a co-operative. The Fairtrade Premium is paid at the co-operative level so that the farmers' democratically elected representatives can decide how the money is spent. It's another way that Fairtrade is unique. We believe that farmers know best how to spend this money. They are in a much better position to decide what investments will improve the quality of their lives than businesses far away. The farmers have the right to choose any activities that are important to their particular situation, aspirations and priorities.

The Great Easter Egg-stravaganza!

On Wednesday 30th March we are inviting children to take part in an Easter Egg hunt in the grounds of the school and enjoy a mufti day.

During the school morning, each class will hunt for eggs and find clues to form an Easter word. At the end the school day, every child will receive a chocolate egg to take home (as long as their parent /carer has given permission via our online form).

To continue to raise funds towards our outdoor classroom we will be asking for a donation of £4 for the egg hunt and £1 for mufti day. We are asking for online payments only please.

We appreciate that finances are very tight for a lot of families so please be assured that if you are unable to donate the £4 suggested as long as you complete the online permission form your child will still receive an egg.
