Fairtrade

U is for Ubuntu Cola

Ubuntu Cola was the first cola in the UK to get the Fairtrade mark (back in 2007) and is made with Fairtrade sugar from the Kasinthula Cooperative in Malawi and from the Kaleya Cooperative in Zambia. It seems an appropriate way to round off an unusual year as the cola is named after the African philosophy of Ubuntu which means humanity or fellow feeling of kindness. Ubuntu give at least 15% of its profits to the Ubuntu Africa Programme which supports sugar producers and their communities and encourages entrepreneurial projects aimed at tackling poverty. However you celebrate the end of the school year, remember to support Fairtrade where possible!

Eco - Tip

It appears that we will be using masks when we are out and about in indoors locations for the foreseeable future. In May a report was released which examined the potential impact of using disposable face masks by the general public. The report estimated that if people used disposable masks we could end up with 66,000 tonnes of contaminated plastic mask waste in the household waste stream. By using reusable masks we will help to prevent this happening and continue to reduce plastic waste.
