World Book Day Tokens


Don't forget to use your World Book Day Token. They are valid until **23rd March** 2025.

Giant eggs to be hidden around London for Big Egg hunt

If you are looking for something different to do with the children at the weekend or during the Easter holidays why not consider a visit to London to take part in the Big Egg Hunt 2025 trail.

A city-wide spectacle will see London filled with more than 100 giant decorated eggs. The Big Egg Hunt 2025 trail will include sites at Battersea Power Station, Covent Garden, Chelsea, Marylebone, Marble Arch and Canary Wharf, as well as Buckingham Palace, the Barbican and the Saatchi Gallery.

Wildlife charity Elephant Family and egg producer Clarence Court are behind the exhibition, which features work from the worlds of art, fashion and food.

Elephant Family described the trail as "a vibrant celebration of art and conservation which can be enjoyed by everyone".

The scattered sculptures are 2ft (0.6m) tall and members of the public will be able to "collect the eggs" from 24 March when they can be found and ticked off on a free app which is set to reveal prizes along the way.

When the exhibition ends, the sculptures will be auctioned to raise funds for Asian wildlife conservation through the charity, Elephant Family, which was founded by the Queen's late brother, Mark Shand

Tick Bite Prevention Week (25 – 31 March 2025); Enjoy the outdoors but 'be tick aware' this spring and summer

As the spring weather arrives, it's important for our health and well-being to get outdoors, enjoy nature and the fresh air. So when you're out and about in grassy or wooded areas, including your local park or garden, there may be ticks.

Ticks are found throughout the year, mostly between spring and summer. 'Being tick aware' can help to reduce the chance of tick bites and risk of <u>Lyme disease</u> or other infections such as <u>Tick-Borne</u> Encephalitis.

Ticks can transmit microbes that cause infections such as Lyme disease though not all ticks carry the microbe. Ticks generally attach to animals though can sometimes bite humans. Lyme disease is a tickborne bacterial infection that can be transmitted to humans if they are bitten by an infected *Ixodes ricinus* tick. Ticks attach to the skin of animals or humans that brush past them. They do not jump or fly.

What does a tick look like? A tiny spider-like creature. It is an arachnid.



How can you reduce the chance of getting a tick bite? Walk on clearly defined paths to avoid brushing against vegetation, use insect repellent, wear light coloured clothes, and perform regular tick checks. You may not feel the bite that's why it's important to do a check.

<u>How do you remove ticks safely and quickly?</u> It is important to <u>remove ticks</u> safely and as quickly as possible to avoid any infection, by using a pair of fine-tipped tweezers or a tick removal tool.

If you begin to feel unwell with flu-like symptoms or develop a spreading circular red rash (which usually appears within 1 to 4 weeks after being bitten), contact your GP or NHS 111 promptly. Let them know if you were bitten by a tick or have recently spent time outdoors.

Find out more about tick awareness from the UK Health Security Agency, <u>Tick bite risks and prevention of Lyme disease: resources - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)</u>. There are downloadable posters and leaflets for you to help raise awareness in your school or organisation. Share with family and friends so they too can keep well, safe and enjoy the outdoors.

UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) launched an enhanced <u>surveillance scheme</u> to understand more about the spread of Lyme disease in England. The scheme asks people who test positive for recently acquired Lyme disease to provide information about where they may have picked up the infection, if they recall a tick bite, where in the country this took place, whether they have any pets, their recent outdoor activities, travel and their occupation.
