Fairtrade

We have been thinking about why Fairtrade is important in our 'circle time' and in class assemblies in Years 1 and 2. This week we looked at how bananas are grown and how they get to our fruit baskets at home. We found out that about 5 billion bananas are eaten in the UK every year. They grow in hot countries like Columbia, they are then bought from the farmers and transported to the UK on ships. When they arrive in the UK they are still green and are stored in a specialized ripening facility before they move to shops in the UK to be sold to all of us.



All of the people who help with the steps along the way need to be paid but it is often the farmer, who grows the bananas in the first place, who is paid the least amount of money. This means many banana farmers live in poverty, and struggle to provide for their families. They also have the least power to do anything about that situation, because they're not in a position to demand a higher price from huge companies like supermarkets.

Fairtrade means that the farmers and workers growing the food get a fairer price which aims to cover their cost of production. Many products like bananas, tea and coffee are often grown on small farms. Rather than deal with big companies who want to buy their products individually, many farmers with small farms join together in what is called a co-operative so that they have more power. The co-operative also gets a bit of extra money called the Fairtrade Premium which can be used to help the whole community.

National survey of children, The Big Ask, launches today

The new Children's Commissioner for England, Dame Rachel de Souza, has today launched <u>The Big Ask</u> – the largest ever consultation with children aged 4 to 17 in England. It aims to find out children's concerns and aspirations about the future, so that we can put children at the heart of our country's recovery from the coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak.

Parents, care leavers and those working with children are invited <u>to complete the adult survey</u> to share their views about the future for children and young people today, and what they think is holding young people back.

The results from this survey will help the Children's Commissioner identify the barriers preventing children from reaching their potential, put forward solutions and set ambitious goals for the country to achieve.
