Fairtrade

In school we have been talking about paying the workers fairly for the things that they grow or make. We have also started to talk about the fact that they also get a little bit of extra money that the community decides how to spend (The Fairtrade Premium). Below is a little bit more information from the Fairtrade website about this money.

WHAT IS THE FAIRTRADE PREMIUM?

The Fairtrade Premium is an extra sum of money paid on top of the selling price that farmers or workers invest in projects of their choice.

They decide together and democratically how to spend the Fairtrade Premium to reach their goals, such as improving their farming, businesses, or health and education in their community. Farmers and workers know best what their priorities and needs are.

Since 2014, Fairtrade farmers and workers have received **well over half a billion euros** in Fairtrade Premium.

This is a unique benefit enabled by your decision to buy Fairtrade products.

Face Coverings

We would like to say a big thank you to The Friends for organising the Second Hand Uniform Sale last Friday, in particular to Miss Naylor & Mrs Bennett for sorting and washing the uniform prior to the sale and to all those parents that helped to man the stall and worked behind the scenes. All the hard work was rewarded with a fantastic profit of £93.

If you missed the sale we are hoping that The Friends will be able to hold another uniform sale later in the summer term when our new intake join us for Summer Club.

Any uniform that you can recycle is not only of benefit to each other but also to the environment as it help's to reduce the amount of clothing going to landfill and ensures we don't waste the world's resources.

Did you know;

The UK could save around £3 billion per year from the cost of the resources we use to make and clean clothes if we changed the way we supplied, used and disposed of clothing. This would reduce the carbon, water and waste footprints of clothing consumption by 10-20% each.

350,000 tonnes, that 's around £140 million worth of used but still wearable clothing goes to landfill in the UK every year.

This equates to more than 30% of our unwanted clothing currently going to landfill.

National survey of children, The Big Ask, launched last week

The new Children's Commissioner for England, Dame Rachel de Souza, has launched <u>The Big Ask</u> – the largest ever consultation with children aged 4 to 17 in England. It aims to find out children's concerns and aspirations about the future, so that we can put children at the heart of our country's recovery from the coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak.

Parents, care leavers and those working with children are invited to complete the adult survey to share their views about the future for children and young people today, and what they think is holding young people back.

The results from this survey will help the Children's Commissioner identify the barriers preventing children from reaching their potential, put forward solutions and set ambitious goals for the country to achieve.

The government has announced that if you're a member of a household, childcare bubble or support bubble of a school pupil, college student or of a staff member, you can get twice-weekly symptom free tests. You can use any testing offered by your employer, **book** an appointment online at a symptom-free testing site, **collect** a home-testing kit from a designated collection point, or if unable to travel to a site, **order** a kit online.
