Message from Ms. Mole

It may only have been a short week but we seem to have done lots this week. Lots of fabulous learning throughout the school and on Thursday Year 2 had an enjoyable and informative day at the British Wildlife Centre. Their visit coincided with Hedgehog Awareness Week. Did you know that hedgehogs are a great indicator species – their needs are quite simple so if they aren't being met, it means the habitat is deficient – and should ring alarm bells for other species, including humans!



Try these wildlife-friendly ways to give hedgehogs the edge:

- Let the edges grow wild! Log piles, leaf heaps, and wild edges attract natural food and offer shelter for hedgehogs. Always carefully check for wildlife before mowing, strimming or tidying wild areas.
- Add Hedgehog highways! These 13cm x 13cm square gaps in the base of boundary walls and fences ensure hedgehogs can access vital habitat. Once made, log them on the <u>Big Hedgehog Map</u>.
- Make **ponds** safe! Ponds are great for wildlife but ensure there are escape routes add sloping edges, ramps or half-submerged rocks so hedgehogs can scramble out.
- Look out for **litter**! Litter is very harmful to wildlife, and while it's hopefully not an issue in your own garden, it's likely to be in the wider environment. Contact landowners where litter is a problem; remember to point out the danger to wildlife.
- Water is vital for all wildlife and can be scarce, especially during hot spells. Make sure there are always clean shallow bowls of water available for hedgehogs add a few pebbles for bees and butterflies to perch on so they Can safely drink too.
- Stop using poisons and pesticides that could directly harm wildlife and destroy the food chain.
- **Netting** can become entangled in hedgehog spines: make sure sports nets are put away and garden netting is raised 30cm off the ground so hedgehogs can safely pass under.

As I finish the newsletter we have some wonderful volunteers who are helping make our grounds look amazing. We will make sure we are following the advice above, so we can do our bit to look after the

Parking

Unfortunately concerns regarding the parking down Howard Road at pick up time have been brought to our attention again. At pick up on Wednesday a car was parked in such a way that it made it extremely difficult for the resident to get out of their drive. It was also opposite other parked cars on the opposite side of the road so it was very tight for cars to get up or down the road and would have been impossible for any form of emergency vehicle to get through.

Can we please remind you, once again, of our schools Parking Policy which can be found in your copy of the School Handbook;

For safety reasons

• If you have to drive to school, cars should be parked in Howard Road, on the school side of the road, or preferably further out on roads such as Crabtree Lane, remembering not to obstruct zigzag lines and driveways. (We are committed to having a positive relationship with our neighbours and it is incredibly frustrating for them when our families park across driveways or in a way that prevents them from entering or leaving their property.)

• **DO NOT** drive into the school grounds unless you are picking your child up with prior permission from the school office or in the case of illness. This includes when dropping off or collecting at before and after school clubs.

Children are permitted to travel to school on bikes and scooters BUT they must dismount at the school gates and then push or carry the items whilst on school premises to avoid accidents to themselves and others. There is a cycle rack in front of the school. **NB.** Please note you must sign up to the safe scootering and/or cycling schemes to obtain a permit for your scooter and/or bike. Please see the separate policy and codes of practice on the school website <u>https://polesdenlaceyinfant.surrey.sch.uk/information/policies</u>

• **NO** parking should take place in Oakdene Close, in order to keep access clear for residents and emergency vehicles and to avoid the dangers involved with cars turning in this narrow cul-de-sac, especially when children are arriving and leaving school.

• It is essential that emergency vehicles have access to the school via Howard Road at all times. <u>Please do</u> <u>not obstruct the road</u>

• Please remember that the road is in constant use and all pedestrians entering or leaving the school should use the pavements on either side of Oakdene Close

This charter for coming into and leaving school has been written by the children: Our coming in to school charter

- Walk your bike and scooter down the school path
 - Put your bike or scooter in the shed
 - Look where you are going
 - Walk on the path with your adult

Always stay with your adult before going into class

Our Parking Charter (also written by the children)

Grown-ups please can you:

- Do park and stride if you can
 - Keep our crossing clear
- Drive slowly (especially on Howard Road)
 - Leave space for emergency vehicles

Forest school

In forest school this week the children made and tried Lilac lemonade. I am reliably informed that it was absolutely delicioussss.....

If you want to try making it at home Miss Aylett has provided us with the recipe that she used;

- 2 cups of lilac flowers
- 1 cup of sugar
- 1 cup of water
- 2/3 lemons

Wash flowers and remove flower stems.

Put flowers, sugar & water in a pan and simmer for 5–10 minutes

Leave to cool for 4-6 hours for best results, then strain into a jar for lilac syrup

Fill a jug with the juice of 2/3 lemons, ice and water then sweeten to taste with the Lilac Syrup. And enjoy!
