Message from Mrs. Mole

Every day is a school day! This week this has certainly turned out to be true for me. In the Forest School sessions Miss. Aylett has been making 'conker soap'! I was intrigued and so went online to do a little research... The chemical aesculin, found in conkers, (a saponin) is responsible for the frothy lather that results from mashing the leaves and conkers in water and is pretty effective at getting hands clean after mooching about in the woods.



The soap made from conkers has a very gentle action compared to some modern day soaps which often contain very caustic additives.

Their use historically, other than a rough woodland soap, was for cleaning delicate fabrics such as old tapestries. Why not try making some yourself? (Smash the conkers in a pestle and mortar. Add water and boil, Strain the liquid. Cool and poor into a recycled bottle ready to wash hands or the dishes!

I also learnt that there are lots of different types of super heroes and they come with all different super powers! Badger class taught me this with their 'super hero day'. They did an excellent job at designing and making their costumes and then solving all the problems set by Miss. Joslin.



Next week I am sure that we will continue to learn even more in our STEM week. We will be designing and making different things as well as having visits from some great scientists who we hope will wow us with the wonders of the natural world and technology.

I hope some of you go out and collect conkers and have a go at making soap.

Driving on Site

It has come to our attention that parents are driving on site when dropping children off or picking up from before and after school clubs. Can I please remind you all that as per the Parent's Handbook, which you would all have been given when your child started at Polesden Lacey Infant School, this is not allowed. Please see excerpt from the Handbook highlighting this issue.

1.1.1 For safety reasons

Please **DO NOT** drive into the school grounds unless you are picking your child up with prior permission from the school office or in the case of illness. *This includes when dropping off or collecting at before and after school clubs.*

Children are permitted to travel to school on bikes and scooters BUT they must dismount at the school gates and then push or carry the items whilst on school premises to avoid accidents to themselves and others. There is a cycle rack in front of the school. **NB.** Please note you must sign up to the safe scootering and/or cycling schemes to obtain a permit for your scooter and/ or bike. Please see the separate policy and codes of practice on the school website <u>https://polesdenlaceyinfant.surrey.sch.uk/information/policies</u>

NO parking should take place in Oakdene Close, in order to keep access clear for residents and emergency vehicles and to avoid the dangers involved with cars turning in this narrow culde-sac, especially when children are arriving and leaving school.

If you have to drive to school, cars should be parked in Howard Road, on the school side of the road, or preferably further out on roads such as Crabtree Lane, remembering not to obstruct zigzag lines and driveways. (We are committed to having a positive relationship with our neighbours and it is incredibly frustrating for them when our families park across driveways or in a way that prevents them from entering or leaving their property.)

It is essential that emergency vehicles have access to the school via Howard Road at all times. <u>Please</u> <u>do not obstruct the road</u>

Please remember that the road is in constant use and all pedestrians entering or leaving the school should use the pavements on either side of Oakdene Close

Please also remember that staff are often arriving or leaving at the same time as you so please make sure that you and your children walk on the path when entering and leaving the school grounds and not on the drive way.

This policy has been endorsed by the school governors and is to help us to keep your children safe.
